Across the country, we recorded steady progress in improving access to training. The Government continued discussions on student funding, a move expected to enable more learners to pursue health training without heavy financial strain. This commitment was

reinforced by H.E. President Dr. William Ruto, who directed that KMTC students be included in the national funding framework. As access improves, more young people are able to take up opportunities that lead to meaningful careers in healthcare. At the same time, the College continued to strengthen the learning environment across its campuses. Investments in hostels, classrooms, laboratories and new campuses, are creating spaces that support both learning and student welfare, while expanding opportunities closer to communities that need health workers most. Throughout the month, training remained at the centre of our work. Our students continued to build skills, confidence and compassion through learning and practical exposure, qualities that prepare our graduates to serve effectively. The Academic Council deliberations further reinforced our commitment to academic excellence, standards and innovation across all programmes. April also demonstrated our growing role beyond national borders. The College hosted participants from 17 African countries for a Mental Health Leadership Programme, creating a plat-

form for shared learning and strengthening capacity across the region. Our engagement with partners from Angola signalled a new phase in international collaboration. Our partnerships continued to support this progress in meaningful ways. Collaboration with organisations such as Beyond Zero, Africa CDC and KUTRRH is strengthening training. Our resource mobilisation policy development and staff training initiatives are further enhancing institutional capacity to sustain this growth. Our graduates continued to access opportunities beyond the country, demonstrating the strength of their training and their readiness to work in diverse healthcare settings. Within our campuses, students remained actively engaged in community outreach, medical camps and innovation activities. As we reflect on the month of April, we remain focused on strengthening the health workforce through quality training, strong partnerships and continued service to the community. I thank our staff, students and partners for their commitment and contribution.

KMTC Students Set to Benefit from Education Funding as H.E. President Ruto Gives Directive

Students at the College are set to benefit from proposed reforms to tertiary education financing. The Ministry of Education has tabled the Tertiary Education Placement and Funding Bill in Parliament, which seeks to merge the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), the TVET Fund, and the University Fund into a single entity to streamline student support.

Speaking on April 14, 2026, during the commissioning of the Affordable Housing Project at KMTC Nyamache Campus, H.E. President Dr. William Ruto directed the Cabinet Secretary for Education, Hon. Julius Ogamba, to ensure KMTC students are included in the funding framework.

“As you finalize the Bill, ensure that KMTC students receive an allocation for the next semester,” said the President. “KMTC trains over 85 percent of Kenya’s health workforce”

CS Ogamba confirmed that the Bill is currently before Parliament, awaiting deliberation, noting that it proposes funding support for all tertiary and university students, including those at KMTC.

The President also announced that the Government will allocate additional resources towards the recruitment of staff for the College.

The Affordable Housing Project on campus will provide accommodation for 340 students, enhancing the learning environment and student welfare.

The President was accompanied by the Cabinet Secretary for Lands, Public Works, Housing and Urban Development Hon. Alice Wahome, and Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards Mary Muthoni, Kisii County Governor Hon. Simba Arati among other leaders.

At the campus, he was received by KMTC Board Chairperson Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Board Directors Ms. Hardlyne Lusui, and Eng. Joseph Atonga, Deputy Director Academics Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, Registrar, Mr. Ronald Wasike, and Nyamache Campus Principal, Mr. Tom Oogo.

H.E. President Ruto Lays Foundation Stone for Students Hostel, Commissions Affordable Housing Project at Nyamira Campus

Nyamira Campus is set for a major infrastructure expansion following a commitment by H.E. President Dr. William Ruto.

The President announced that the campus will benefit from the construction of hostels, under the affordable housing project spearheaded by the State Department for Housing and Urban Development, with a capacity of 580 students, 20 classrooms, and five laboratories to support training.

Speaking on April 13, 2026, during the laying of the foundation stone for students' hostels at Nyamira campus, Dr. Ruto reaffirmed the Government's commitment to achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

"Achieving UHC will not be possible without health professionals. We require more nurses, radiographers, and other health cadres," said the President.

He noted that expanding training infrastructure is key to producing a skilled health workforce.

"To have the best skills, you need adequate classrooms, hostels, and laboratories. It is for this reason that we are invest-

ing in these resources," he added.

The President further committed to expanding Nyamira County Referral Hospital, which serves as a clinical placement site for KMTTC students.

While highlighting progress in the housing sector, Dr. Ruto noted that the Government will intensify efforts to deliver on its affordable housing agenda.

The President was accompanied by Deputy President H.E. Kithure Kindiki, Cabinet Secretary for Lands, Public Works, Housing and Urban Development Hon. Alice Wahome, and Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards Mary Muthoni, among other leaders.

At the campus, he was received by KMTTC Board Chairperson Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Board Directors Ms. Hardlyne Lusui and Eng. Joseph Atonga, Deputy Director Academics, Dr Nyawira Mwangi, Registrar, Mr Ronald Wasike, and Nyamira Campus Principal, Mrs. Alice Wagunda.

College Hosts 17 African Countries for the Africa CDC Sponsored Mental Health Leadership Training

Kenya has taken a significant step in strengthening mental health leadership across Africa by hosting the second edition of the Mental Health Leadership Programme at the College, in partnership with the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention.

The two-week training, running from April 20 to May 1, 2026, brings together participants from 17 African countries, positioning Kenya at the forefront of continental efforts to build a skilled mental health workforce and responsive health systems.

Presiding over the launch in Nairobi on April 20, 2026, Principal Secretary, State Department of Public Health and Professional Standards, Mary Muthoni, emphasised the urgency of investing in mental health systems, noting its central role in healthcare delivery.

“In Kenya, mental health remains a significant part of the health system. About one in four people seeking care has a mental health condition,” she said.

She highlighted Kenya's progress in strengthening the policy and legal framework, citing the Mental Health (Amendment) Act, 2022, the Kenya Mental Health Policy, the Mental Health Action Plan, and workplace mental wellness guidelines.

She further pointed to the Primary Health Care Act of Kenya as a critical instrument that integrates mental health into primary healthcare, ensuring that services are accessible at the community level and embedded within routine care.

In a call for cultural change, the Principal Secretary urged Kenyans to seek help, noting that vulnerability is not weakness, adding that the Social Health Insurance Fund now includes a mental health package, signaling the government's commitment to accessible care.

The KMTTC Board Chairperson, Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, noted that collaboration between the College, Africa CDC, Ministries of Health, development partners, and civil society is strengthening shared learning and advancing mental health systems across the continent.

CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch highlighted the strategic importance of the programme and Kenya's growing role in global health discourse. “This year's cohort brings together participants from 17 African countries, creating a strong network of professionals who are ready to shape the future of mental health across the continent.”

He added, “The timing of this programme is important. It comes at a moment when Kenya will host the World Health Summit in Nairobi, placing the country at the centre of global and continental health conversations.”

Dr. Oluoch further outlined KMTTC's growing investment in mental health training, including a Centre of Excellence at Mathari Campus, programmes offered across seven campuses, and partnerships with organisations such as Johnson & Johnson, which have supported the training of over 200 health workers.

On the continental front, Africa CDC Head of Disease Con-

trol and Prevention Dr. Mohammed Abdulaziz described the partnership as both strategic and transformative.

“We were looking for the best training College in Kenya, and KMTC fit the profile of the institution we wanted to partner with. This partnership is critical for developing middle-level healthcare professionals with mental health skills.”

He revealed that Kenya is hosting the East African segment of five similar programmes across the continent and hinted at long-term integration, “We will discuss how to integrate this course into KMTC’s curriculum to support ongoing capacity development of mental health healthcare workers.”

Speaking on April 30, 2026, during the mental health leadership and advocacy public lecture, renowned psychiatrist and champion of Chiromo Hospital Group, Dr. Frank Njenga encouraged speaking out to combat mental health illness, “silence is no longer an option,” he emphasized

The programme aims to equip mental health advocates and professionals with leadership skills to support the delivery of evidence-based prevention and care interventions.

According to the World Health Organisation, one in every eight people globally lives with a mental health condition, yet in many low- and middle-income countries, up to 75% of those affected receive no treatment. The gap is not only

The training targets psychiatrists, psychologists, psychiatric nurses, social workers, public health practitioners, policy-makers, government officials, NGO leaders, researchers, academics, human resource professionals, and leaders in media and education.

Government Leads Call for Stronger Health Partnerships as KMTC Anchors Workforce Growth

“Strengthening coordination and partnerships across the health sector is critical to delivering quality, accessible healthcare for all Kenyans.”

With this call, Principal Secretary, State Department for Public Health and Professional Standards, Mary Muthoni, set the tone for a high-level consultative meeting held on April 22, 2026, at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre, bringing into sharp focus the role of institutions like KMTC in driving the country’s health agenda.

At the centre of these efforts is KMTC, whose CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, reaffirmed the College’s pivotal contribution to national healthcare delivery. He noted that KMTC trains over 85 percent of Kenya’s middle level health workforce, positioning the College as a cornerstone in the implementation of public health priorities.

Dr. Oluoch emphasised that the KMTC’s mandate goes beyond training, highlighting the College’s growing role in shaping a responsive, resilient health system through strategic collaboration.

“Strengthening partnerships across the health sector is essential if we are to build a workforce that can respond to the

country's evolving health needs. At KMTC, we are committed to training competent, compassionate professionals who will drive quality healthcare at all levels," he said.

He further called on the government, development partners, and community stakeholders to work closely with the College to mentor and inspire young people to pursue careers in health, an intervention he described as critical to closing workforce gaps and improving national health outcomes.

"We urge stakeholders to work with us in inspiring and guiding the next generation into health professions. This is an investment not just in individuals, but in the future of

our health system," he added.

The meeting, which brought together actors from the Ministry of Health, civil society, and development partners, exemplified the importance of community-driven approaches in advancing primary healthcare, disease prevention, and health promotion, areas where KMTC-trained professionals continue to serve on the frontlines.

As KMTC approaches its centenary, Dr. Oluoch reaffirmed the College's commitment to excellence, positioning it not only as a training institution but as a strategic national asset in strengthening Kenya's health system.

Beyond Zero to Sponsor Additional 205 KMTC Students on AI integrated maternal and newborn care training

The College has strengthened its collaboration with Beyond Zero to integrate Artificial Intelligence (AI) into Emergency Obstetric and Newborn Care (EmONC) and Obstetric Point-of-Care Ultrasound (OPOCUS) training, to improve maternal and child health outcomes in underserved regions.

The partnership was highlighted during a stakeholder sensitisation held on April 9, 2026, in Nairobi, which brought together key partners to align efforts, build consensus, and mobilise support for the successful implementation of AI-enabled training.

Since 2016, KMTC, in collaboration with Beyond Zero, the Ministry of Health, and the World Bank, has trained 1,454 Kenya Enrolled Community Health Nurses serving in ASAL counties and other underserved areas.

Building on this progress, the two organisations signed a Memorandum of Understanding in January 2026 to train

an additional 80 students and 125 in-service nurses in EmONC and OPOCUS.

The meeting brought together representatives from KMTC, Beyond Zero, the Ministry of Health, and the Nursing Council of Kenya.

The KMTC delegation was led by CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, accompanied by Deputy Director, Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, Head of Intergovernmental Relations Dr. Leah Bii, and members of the programme team.

Speaking during the meeting, Dr. Oluoch noted that the partnership with Beyond Zero continues to make a meaningful impact on the lives of vulnerable populations.

"The healthcare environment continues to evolve, and integrating AI into EmONC training will support the country in achieving its maternal and child health targets," he said.

He added that the College has taken deliberate steps to adopt emerging technologies, including developing a policy

to guide the use of AI in training and service delivery.

Dr. Oluoch further emphasised the importance of equipping lecturers with AI competencies to ensure effective delivery of the programme and to prepare graduates with skills that respond to modern healthcare demands.

The integration of AI into EmONC and OPOCUS training is expected to enhance clinical decision-making, improve the quality of care, and strengthen the capacity of health workers serving in resource-constrained settings.

KMTC Students Set to Benefit from HELB Loans

CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, joined participants at the 2nd Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) Consultative Forum for Funders and Specialised Training Institutions, in Naivasha.

The forum, held under the theme “Collaborative Pathways to National Skills Development,” brought together leaders from government, financial institutions, and training colleges.

The discussions centred on how to improve student funding and support skills development in Kenya.

Dr. Oluoch took part in these discussions to support KMTC’s goal of helping students access funding.

For many years, the College has called for KMTC students to be included in the HELB loan programme so that more students can afford medical training.

In April 2025, Dr. Oluoch presented this request to Parliamentary Committees on Health and Education. He asked that KMTC students receive the same support as students at universities and Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institutions.

At the Naivasha forum, participants discussed ways to increase access to student funding, strengthen partnerships between HELB, government and training institutions, align funding with workforce needs, and develop fair, sustainable models for middle level colleges

Dr. Oluoch remains steadfast in the belief that student funding is important in helping more young people train as health professionals. He added that partnerships will help close the current funding gaps.

KMTC’s participation in the forum shows its continued role in shaping education funding in Kenya and supporting the training of skilled health workers.

The meeting is convened shortly after H.E President Dr. William Ruto directed the Cabinet Secretary for Education, Hon. Julius Ogamba, to ensure that KMTC students are incorporated into the funding scheme.

KMTC Pension Schemes Launch New Strategic Plan as Assets Hit KSh 8.4 Billion

The College Staff Retirement Benefits Scheme (DBS) and the Staff Pension Scheme 2011 (DCS) have unveiled a five-year Strategic Plan for 2026–2030, the first ever for the schemes, setting the stage for stronger governance, improved investment performance, enhanced member services, and long-term sustainability of the schemes.

The Strategic Plan was launched during the Schemes' Annual General Meeting held on April 30, 2026, at KMTC Murang'a Campus and virtually via Zoom, bringing together trustees, members, service providers, and regulators to review the schemes' performance for the financial year ending June 30, 2025.

The AGM also announced the establishment of a Post-Retirement Medical Fund, a contributory arrangement to support retirees' healthcare expenses.

Financial results presented during the meeting showed continued growth in the schemes' performance. Total combined assets stood at KSh 8.4 billion as of June 2025, while the Defined Contribution Scheme recorded a net return of 18.21 percent during the period under review.

Speaking on behalf of the sponsor, KMTC Board Chairperson Mr Joseah K. Cheruiyot reaffirmed the College's commitment to safeguarding staff retirement security through sustained financial and governance support. "A pension scheme is more than a financial arrangement; it is a commitment to the dignity, stability, and well-being of staff beyond active service. As a sponsor, we remain committed to ensuring the schemes remain sustainable, accountable, and responsive to members' needs," he said.

Mr. Cheruiyot further noted that the College continues to support the Defined Benefits Scheme through enhanced

contributions and remedial funding measures aimed at strengthening the scheme's financial position.

Board of Trustees Chairperson, Mr. Winbert Wanyama, described the newly launched Strategic Plan as a roadmap designed to position the schemes for resilience and growth amid changing economic and regulatory environments.

"This Strategic Plan reflects our long-term vision for the schemes. It focuses on strengthening investment performance, enhancing governance, improving operational efficiency, and delivering greater value to members while safeguarding sustainability for future generations," he said.

Mr. Wanyama also highlighted key milestones achieved during the year under review, including the rollout of online access to pension statements as part of the schemes' digital transformation agenda. "This platform enhances transparency and allows members to access their pension information and make informed retirement decisions conveniently," he noted.

The meeting further reaffirmed the schemes' commitment to prudent fund management, compliance with Retirement Benefits Authority regulations, and enhanced member engagement as KMTC continues to strengthen retirement security for staff across the College.

KMTC, Kajiado County Deepen Partnership as Construction Launch Signals Start of New Campus

The College, in partnership with the County Government of Kajiado, has officially begun construction of the proposed Kajiado Campus, marking a significant milestone in expanding access to healthcare training and strengthening the local health workforce.

The launch ceremony, presided over by Kajiado Governor Hon. Joseph Ole Lenku, underscored a shared commitment to invest in human capital and build sustainable healthcare capacity within the county. The Governor announced that the County Government will allocate KSh 20 million in the upcoming financial year towards the project, while Kipeto Energy pledged an additional KSh 10 million in support.

Describing the initiative as transformative, Governor Lenku noted that the new campus will open up opportunities for local youth, reduce the need for students to seek training outside the county, and enhance healthcare service delivery across the region.

From a governance perspective, the KMTC Board Chairperson, Mr Joseah K. Cheruiyot, highlighted that the project is anchored in a structured, collaborative framework between the College and the County Government. The partnership was formalised through a Memorandum of Understanding signed in March 2023, followed by the establishment of a Joint Technical Committee in December 2024 to oversee implementation.

The Chairperson further noted that the Kajiado Campus will play a key role in advancing equitable access to quality medical training while supporting the development of a sustainable, locally trained health workforce.

Speaking during the launch, KMTC Chief Executive Officer Dr. Kelly Oluoch emphasised that the groundbreaking signals a shift from planning to implementation. “This marks the beginning of a critical phase that calls for disciplined execution, strong coordination among stakeholders, and timely mobilisation of resources to ensure the project is delivered efficiently,” he said.

The CEO noted that the campus will help ease pressure on existing KMTC facilities while expanding access for students from Kajiado and neighbouring counties. He added that the project is expected to stimulate local economic activity through increased demand for goods and services.

The campus, to be developed on a 50-acre parcel of land donated by the County Government, will feature modern training facilities and a multi-purpose sports complex designed to serve both institutional and community needs, including hosting future graduation ceremonies. The County is also mobilising additional partners to support the project’s development and long-term sustainability.

Plans are already underway to strengthen the campus through phased investments in infrastructure, staffing, and training capacity, aligned with KMTC’s broader expansion strategy.

KMTC, Angola Advance Plans for Health Training Partnership

The College has taken a significant step toward strengthening international collaboration in health training following a high-level meeting with representatives from Angola's Ministry of Health and the Embassy of Angola.

The meeting, held at the College Headquarters, builds on ongoing engagements to facilitate the admission and training of Angolan health professionals at KMTC.

The delegation, led by the First Secretary at the Angolan Consulate, Mr. Lemos Correia, held discussions with CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, focusing on practical arrangements ahead of the anticipated arrival of the first cohort of students. Key areas of discussion included programme selection, accommodation, and logistical planning.

Proposed training areas span both clinical and technical fields, including specialised nursing programmes in paediatrics, neurology and rehabilitation. Other areas include radiography, medical laboratory sciences, occupational therapy and medical engineering.

In a move aimed at enhancing both access and quality, Dr. Oluoch proposed a hybrid training model that blends in-country training in Angola with hands-on experience in Kenya. Under this approach, KMTC lecturers would travel to Angola to deliver part of the training, while students

would undertake classroom learning and selected practical sessions in Kenya.

"This partnership reflects our shared commitment to building a resilient and skilled health workforce across borders. By combining local context with international training standards, we are creating a model that is both practical and sustainable for Angola while strengthening KMTC's global footprint," said Dr. Oluoch.

The discussions also highlighted the importance of preparatory measures, including English-language proficiency and curriculum alignment, to ensure that students transition smoothly into their programmes.

A follow-up meeting with Kenya's Cabinet Secretary for Health is scheduled to refine key aspects of the partnership and align outstanding issues ahead of formal agreements.

The collaboration is expected to strengthen healthcare workforce development, deepen bilateral relations between Kenya and Angola, and position KMTC as a key player in global health training.

Also in attendance were Head of Technical Management at Angola's Ministry of Health Mr. Job Monteiro, Deputy Director, Finance, Planning and Administration, Ms. Lucy Chebungei, and Head of Intergovernmental Relations Dr. Leah Bii.

KMTC Staff Complete Advanced Emergency and Critical Care Training in South Korea

A team of 14 staff members from the College has completed an advanced international capacity-building programme in Emergency and Critical Care Services at Inha University Hospital in Incheon, the Republic of Korea, further strengthening the College's efforts to enhance specialised healthcare training in Kenya.

The training, conducted in April 2026 under the Korea International Cooperation Agency Capacity Improvement and Advancement for Tomorrow (KOICA CIAT) Capacity Building Programme, brought together KMTC faculty and senior managers for intensive exposure to advanced emergency response systems, critical care technologies, trauma management, disaster preparedness, and simulation-based learning.

In her remarks during the opening session, the leader of the delegation and Deputy Director of Finance, Planning and Administration, Ms. Lucy Chebungei, highlighted that "The future of healthcare training lies in building practical, adaptive systems that respond to emerging health challenges. This programme strengthens our capacity to train a workforce that can respond effectively to emergency and critical care needs, both locally and globally."

Reflecting on the experience, Ms. Chebungei noted that the programme reinforced the importance of investing in people and institutional systems. "As a senior leader, I see investing in people as a strategic priority, not a cost. Korea's efficiency, disciplined use of resources, and strong institutional systems were deeply impressive. The experience strengthened my commitment to champion similar investments at KMTC so our trainees can thrive," she said.

The programme introduced participants to Korea's highly integrated healthcare system, covering advanced ICU monitoring, air ambulance operations, trauma response protocols,

paediatric critical care, Point-of-Care Ultrasound (POCUS), and disaster preparedness systems.

Participants also undertook clinical rounds at Inha University Hospital and practical sessions in high-fidelity simulation laboratories designed to strengthen emergency response and decision-making under pressure.

One of the key discussions during the programme focused on balancing international partnerships with national data governance and health system priorities.

Speaking during the programme reflections, Resource Mobilisation Manager Mr Job Nyakado emphasised the need to protect national interests while strengthening global partnerships. "Every resource mobilisation decision is also a data governance decision. Kenya needs external investment to strengthen its health workforce, while partners require data to demonstrate impact. When managed properly through strong governance structures and institutional capacity, this relationship becomes a strategic advantage," he noted.

The delegation further identified opportunities for KMTC to strengthen competency-based emergency care training through simulation learning, improved ICU skills development, and enhanced training in trauma care and paediatric critical care.

The programme also reinforced the growing partnership between KMTC and KOICA, with recommendations to expand future cohorts and to deepen collaboration in specialised healthcare training.

As part of the way forward, the College plans to cascade the knowledge gained across campuses and integrate key lessons into curriculum development and emergency care training programmes, further positioning KMTC as a key driver in strengthening emergency and critical care capacity in Kenya.

College Academic Council Convenes to Strengthen Academic Excellence

The KMTTC Academic Council, held from April 13–17, 2026, provided a platform for academic leaders to reflect on progress while setting a deliberate path forward for the College’s academic agenda.

Opening the Council, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch challenged members to align every aspect of training with global standards. “If we are to remain relevant in a rapidly changing healthcare environment, our systems must reflect the discipline, quality, and integrity of a truly global institution,” he said.

Dr. Oluoch noted that the College is working closely with key partners, including the Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service (KUCCPS), to enhance access to training opportunities and strengthen student placement pathways.

“Access to training should be seamless and inclusive. We are continuously engaging our partners to ensure that more qualified candidates are able to take up opportunities within the College,” he added.

Regarding staffing, the CEO announced plans to recruit 100 staff in the near term, with an additional 1,000 positions expected following a recent presidential directive. “As we expand, we must invest in our people as deliberately as we invest in infrastructure. A strong institution is built on a healthy, motivated workforce,” he noted.

He further commended Homa Bay Campus students for their outstanding presentation on digital innovation at the Kenya Medical Association conference. “Innovation is no longer optional, it is the space where the future of healthcare training will be defined, and KMTTC must be at the centre of that conversation,” he said.

The College also reaffirmed its commitment to ensuring KMTTC students benefit from Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) support following the recent presidential directive.

“No student should be forced to abandon their training due to financial constraints. We are committed to working with the government to make this support accessible,” the CEO emphasised.

In her address, Deputy Director Academics Dr. Nyawira Mwangi emphasised the strategic importance of the Academic Council.

“This forum is where we shape decisions that directly affect the quality of training across all our campuses,” she said.

She also highlighted the role of staff welfare in institutional growth. “A productive academic environment begins with a supported workforce. When we invest in staff well-being, we strengthen the entire institution,” she noted.

Highlighting community impact, Dr. Mwangi praised initiatives such as the bodaboda riders’ training programme.

“When we equip communities with life-saving skills, we extend our impact beyond classrooms and into real lives. That is the true meaning of training for service,” she added.

The outcomes of the Council are expected to inform strategic decisions to enhance teaching effectiveness, enrich student learning experiences, and sustain KMTTC’s position as a leader in training competent and globally competitive healthcare professionals.

Homa Bay Campus Students Shine at 2026 KMA Conference; Invited to Present in Zambia

K MTC Homa Bay Campus students took centre stage at the 53rd Kenya Medical Association (KMA) Annual Scientific Conference in Naivasha after presenting an innovative, student-led digital solution in clinical training.

The innovation, dubbed MedHist, is an AI-powered clinical history-taking simulation platform developed by third-year Clinical Medicine students Angel Cephas and Ann Wangari.

The project was selected for presentation in the conference's Early Innovators category following the submission of an abstract in response to a call from the KMA.

Presenting at the conference, Angel Cephas explained that the platform is designed to strengthen clinical training through guided practice.

“MedHist helps students practise structured patient interviews in a safe and repeatable environment while receiving real-time feedback,” she said.

“Our goal was to strengthen clinical reasoning and communication before students interact with real patients,” she added.

The platform guides users through the history-taking process, assesses response quality, and provides corrective suggestions, helping to build confidence and consistency in clinical practice.

Ann Wangari, who co-developed the platform, noted that

the innovation was informed by challenges experienced during training.

“Many students may face limited patient exposure and inconsistent clinical practice opportunities. This platform supports continuous learning and better prepares students for real clinical encounters,” she told conference participants.

The presentation received positive feedback from medical practitioners, with several expressing interest in adopting the platform within their institutions.

The innovation has also attracted regional attention, with

the students invited to present MedHist to medical practitioners in Zambia.

Speaking during the conference, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch commended the students for their creativity and commitment to advancing healthcare training.

He noted that the innovation provides a practical response to gaps in clinical exposure.

Dr. Oluoch, who addressed delegates under the theme “Beyond Resilience: Building Smart, Connected and Inclusive Systems,” said the recognition of the students’ work at a national platform underscores KMTC’s growing role in health innovation and research.

Homa Bay Campus Principal, Ms. Florence Oloo, lauded the students for their achievement, noting that the project had earlier stood out during the Campus Science Week held between April 6 and 10, 2026.

“This is one of the most outstanding innovations we have seen at the campus level. It reflects the creativity and potential of our students,” she said.

The weeklong KMA Annual Scientific Conference brought together healthcare professionals, educators, researchers, and policymakers to shape healthcare policy, practice, and professional standards in Kenya.

Physiotherapy graduates win big in Germany job placements

KMTC physiotherapy graduates are making strong strides in the international job market, taking the largest share of recent healthcare placements in Germany.

Dr. Oluoch noted that while KMTC graduates have largely been placed in the United Kingdom, Australia, the U.S., Asia, and a couple of European countries, it is the first time the College is exploring the German markets.

Germany presents a key opportunity due to its ageing population and the growing burden of chronic conditions requiring rehabilitation. The World Health Organisation highlights rising global demand for physiotherapy services, and with over 20% of Germany’s population aged 65 and above, the country faces significant workforce gaps.

Dr. Oluoch noted that the collaboration reflects KMTC’s

commitment to training competent health professionals and positioning them for global opportunities.

“Our graduates are highly skilled and are able to compete and thrive on the international stage,” he said.

Germany’s healthcare system is currently facing a shortage of more than 20,000 physiotherapists, creating strong demand for qualified professionals. KMTC graduates continue to stand out for their practical skills and adaptability in diverse healthcare settings.

Alex Omwari, a KMTC-trained physiotherapist now working in Germany, described the experience as life-changing.

“I did not imagine my training would take me ‘majuu’ (abroad). This opportunity is helping me grow both professionally and personally. KMTC gave me a strong foundation, and working here is expanding my skills,” he said.

KMTC Moves to Secure Future of Health Workforce in Strategic Alliance with KUTRRH

A strategic partnership is taking shape between KMTC and Kenyatta University Teaching, Referral and Research Hospital (KUTRRH), a deliberate, forward-looking move to secure the future of Kenya's healthcare workforce.

During a meeting held on April 1, 2026, KMTC leadership made a strong case for enhanced collaboration, framing the engagement as both institutional cooperation and a critical intervention to protect and strengthen clinical training opportunities for thousands of College students nationwide.

Leading the KMTC delegation, Board Chairperson Mr. Joseph K. Cheruiyot underscored the urgency of the moment. "This is a strategic investment in the future of our students and, by extension, the health of our country. Accessible, high-quality clinical training is non-negotiable if we are to produce competent professionals," he said.

KMTC CEO Dr Kelly Oluoch echoed the Chairperson's sentiments, describing the partnership as a safeguard for student training pathways amid mounting pressure on clinical placement spaces. "We are taking deliberate steps to ensure sustainable, high-quality training environments for our students. This partnership guarantees they will not be left behind in an increasingly competitive clinical training landscape," he stated.

At the heart of the College's proposals were measures aimed at removing barriers to training - including increased placement slots, reduced financial burden on students, and structured supervision through faculty involvement. These, leaders emphasised, are essential to ensuring equity and quality in medical education.

KUTRRH leadership welcomed the engagement, signalling openness to a partnership that aligns training with the hospital's commitment to excellence.

Board Chairperson Mr. James Wambu acknowledged the shared responsibility in shaping Kenya's health sector. "We appreciate KMTC's role in building the nation's health workforce. Where we are able to support, we will, because this is ultimately about delivering better healthcare for Kenyans," he said.

The Hospital's CEO Dr. Zeinab Gura speaking during the engagement said, "We are committed to collaboration, but we must also ensure that training maintains the highest standards. With the right structures, this partnership can be transformative," she stated.

The importance of this partnership lies in the unique strengths each institution brings. KMTC, with nearly 100 years of experience and a diverse, established training curriculum, remains the backbone of Kenya's health training system. KUTRRH, by contrast, embodies the future of specialised care, with advanced infrastructure, a 650-bed capacity, and cutting-edge technologies such as the CyberKnife, making it one of only two hospitals in Africa equipped with this technology.

A joint committee is now set to formalise the collaboration through a Memorandum of Understanding, signalling the beginning of what could become a cornerstone partnership in Kenya's journey toward a resilient, future-ready health system.

College Enhances Institutional Capacity Through Resource Mobilisation Policy Development and Staff Training

KMTC has intensified efforts to strengthen institutional capacity through a resource mobilisation policy development workshop and targeted staff training initiatives to enhance efficiency, safety, and service delivery.

The College held a resource mobilisation policy development workshop in Kisumu, bringing together key stakeholders to develop a comprehensive strategy that will guide how KMTCC secures, manages, and accounts for resources. The weeklong workshop, held from April 6 to 10, 2026, focused on aligning resource mobilisation efforts with the College's Strategic Plan while promoting coordination, accountability, and increased visibility.

Speaking during the session, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch emphasised the importance of translating policy into action, saying, "Resource mobilisation is critical in bridging the gaps

we face as an institution. It is not enough to develop policies; we must operationalise them, communicate them effectively, and ensure they deliver results."

He emphasised that the policy should serve as a unifying framework across the College, noting, "This policy must be all-encompassing. It should bring us together, eliminate silos, and channel all our efforts towards a common goal. When we work in synergy, we achieve far more."

The CEO further highlighted the need to leverage collective experience and strengthen stakeholder engagement to enhance resource mobilisation outcomes.

"We must map our stakeholders, increase our visibility, and track what we are mobilising against our strategic goals. Unity is power, let us succeed together."

In a parallel effort to strengthen operational capacity, KMTC trained 124 drivers in collaboration with the Kenya Institute of Highways and Building Technology (KIHBT), with a focus on road safety, defensive driving, and vehicle management.

The training covered key areas including road security management, preventive maintenance, safe driving practices, basic first aid, and compliance with the Traffic Act and Highway Code.

Addressing the drivers, Dr Oluoch emphasised their vital role in protecting lives, stressing, “You carry the most valu-

able cargo we have, our students. Your responsibility goes beyond driving; you are ambassadors of KMTC on the road.”

He cautioned against risky behaviours such as fatigue and substance abuse, noting their contribution to road accidents. “Fatigue is a leading cause of accidents. Avoid driving when tired, ensure vehicles are roadworthy, and uphold discipline at all times,” he said.

The CEO also reassured staff about ongoing efforts to enhance welfare, including improved working conditions and supportive Human Resource policies.

Where Science Meets Compassion: Petite Ng’ang’a’s Journey in Mortuary Care

Meet Petite Ng’ang’a, a KMTC alumna and Mortuary Technologist at Murang’a County Referral Hospital, where she leads morgue services.

Petite’s journey into mortuary science was inspired by an early fascination with forensic science and a deep curiosity about the processes surrounding death and investigations. What began as interest soon evolved into purpose. “I realised I could combine science and service to families,” she reflects. Determined to pursue this path, Petite enrolled in mortuary science training at KMTC, where she built a strong foundation in both technical skills and ethical practice.

Her training not only equipped her with the competencies required in the field but also instilled discipline, resilience, and a deep understanding of the human aspect of her work. Today, in her role at Murang’a County Referral Hospital,

she oversees morgue operations, ensuring that the highest standards of care, respect, and professionalism are upheld.

Her work goes beyond technical procedures to supporting families during some of the most difficult moments of their lives.

“Knowing that you helped a family say goodbye in a dignified way is very fulfilling,” she says.

Beyond her clinical responsibilities, Petite is actively shaping the future of the profession.

She serves as the Vice Chairperson of the Morticians and Allied Professionals Association of Kenya (MAPAKE).

She is also a strong voice for mental health awareness in the field, acknowledging the profession’s emotional demands.

Her contributions extend to research and curriculum development, helping to strengthen training and ensure that future mortuary professionals are equipped with both technical expertise and emotional intelligence required in such a sensitive field.

Petite is candid about the challenges that come with her work, including societal misconceptions and the emotional weight of dealing with death daily.

However, she emphasises that compassion remains at the core of everything she does.

Her journey is a powerful reminder of the often-unseen yet critical role that mortuary professionals play within the healthcare system.

While their work may happen behind the scenes, its impact is deeply felt by families and communities.

She reminds us that behind every profession lies humanity: “This profession requires compassion, respect, and emotional intelligence,” she says, adding, “We may work behind the scenes, but our work matters.”

Mombasa Campus President's Award Kenya Lead Charge Against Youth Gambling

A much-needed conversation took shape along the Coast as members of the President's Award Kenya (PA-K) at KMTc Mombasa, stepped forward to confront a growing yet often overlooked threat: youth gambling.

Under the theme "End the Gamble, Start the Journey," the campus has launched a weeklong awareness campaign to steer young people away from risky betting habits and toward more purposeful life choices.

The initiative, officially unveiled on Monday, April 27, 2026, brings together leaders, educators, and community stakeholders united by a shared concern: the rising social and economic toll of gambling among the youth. The campaign will run through Friday, May 1, 2026, blending awareness, mentorship, and community outreach and will see the PA-K members take the message to KMTc Kilifi, Pwani University and Malindi High School.

Mombasa County Executive Committee Member for Youth, Gender, Sports and Social Services, Dr. Jonathan Wepukhulu, did not mince words on the urgency of the issue. "Gambling is silently eroding the potential of our youth. What begins as recreation can quickly spiral into dependency, financial strain, and lost opportunities. This is a challenge that calls for collective action," he said.

From the perspective of rehabilitation and youth development, Prof. Jostinah W. Mwang'ombe of Shimo Borstal

Education Institution pointed to the deeper responsibility of training institutions. "Preparing competent health professionals goes beyond the classroom. It is about nurturing resilience, awareness, and the ability to make sound life choices. This initiative speaks directly to that responsibility," she noted.

Representing the KMTc Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Deputy Registrar (Quality Assurance) Ms. Lucy Kuria brought the message closer to reality, drawing from lived experiences.

"We often encounter young people whose journeys into difficulty begin with habits that appear harmless. Prevention through awareness and engagement is far more effective than intervention after the damage is done," she said.

Beyond speeches, the campaign is designed as a hands-on, student-centred movement, featuring peer advocacy sessions, mentorship forums, counselling clinics, and community outreach activities. These engagements aim to spark honest conversations while equipping young people with practical tools to make informed decisions.

Among those in attendance were representatives from President's Award Kenya, and KMTc Mombasa Principal Dr. Jacinta Mukonzo, alongside other leaders.

Mombasa Campus Hosts Resilience Tour on Mental Health

On April 9, 2026, the Mombasa Campus hosted The Resilience Tour – Campus Edition, a mental health awareness event that brought students together for open and honest conversations about well-being.

Guided by the theme “Healing Minds Through Science and Creative Expression,” the event combined medical insights with creative forms of expression. One of the most powerful moments came from a guest artist who candidly shared his journey of recovery after 25 years of substance use. He spoke about his experiences and the challenges faced by family members dealing with similar struggles, reminding students that healing is possible and that seeking help is important.

An alumnus and former Students Representative Council Chair also shared his personal battle with depression, encouraging students to speak out and support one another. His message resonated deeply: no one should struggle in silence.

The event received support from partners, including the Kenya Mental and AIDS Consortium and the Technical University of Mombasa, highlighting the importance of collaboration in promoting mental health awareness.
