He further outlined ongoing reforms, including the rollout of the Social Health Authority and the recruitment of Community Health Promoters, describing them as critical steps toward building a responsive, people-focused healthcare system that reaches every Kenyan, wherever they reside.

Government Commits to Strengthening Human Resource for Health

The Government has reaffirmed its commitment to strengthening Human Resources for Health as a critical foundation for achieving Universal Health Coverage during a visit to the KMTC Kilifi on December 15, 2025.

The visit was led by the Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards, Mary Muthoni, and focused on reviewing training quality, institutional standards, and the overall preparedness of health professionals. She was accompanied by KMTC Board Director Mr. Adan Harakhe, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, and the Kilifi County Commissioner, Mr. David Wanyonyi.

During the visit, the PS highlighted key priority areas including compliance with regulatory requirements, strengthening clinical training and partnerships, improving staff welfare, promoting integrity and accountability, encouraging innovation, and enhancing community impact. These elements, she noted, are essential in building a responsive and effective health workforce.

Engagements with students emphasized the importance of professionalism, ethical conduct, excellence in training, and a strong service-oriented mindset to support people-centred healthcare delivery.

Founded in 1987, KMTC Kilifi Campus has a student capacity of 978 and offers programmes in Medical Engineering, Clinical Medicine and Surgery, Community Health Nursing, Orthopaedic and Trauma Medicine, and Critical Care Nursing. The institution remains a key contributor to the training of skilled health professionals in line with national health priorities.

This visit demonstrates the Government's continued support for medical training institutions as strategic partners in strengthening the healthcare system and improving health outcomes across the country.

Teaching Methodology Training Conducted for KMTC Faculty

The College remains steadfast in its commitment to reskill its faculty. This was evident during the Teaching Methodology course for KMTC Lecturers conducted between November 17 and 28, 2025, at KMTC Nakuru campus. The training brought together 102 lecturers drawn from across the KMTC campuses. Facilitated by the Department of Health Professions Education, the training aimed at empowering lecturers to be more adept at facilitating learning. It enhanced the pedagogical and leadership skills of the lecturers, enabling them to create more effective learning environments in classrooms and practical training sites. The lecturers were taken through a series of interactive sessions designed to enhance

their skills in facilitation, instructional materials development, curriculum design, assessment of learning, and digital education.

The two-week workshop used a blended learning approach in which participants were introduced to the course through a one-week fully online module. The face-to-face component provided an opportunity to demonstrate practical concepts and engage in peer collaboration. At the core of this training is a microteaching opportunity where faculty members conduct a teaching session and are observed then given feedback by their colleagues.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Franklin Lewa, Head of the Department of Health Professions Education, urged the participants to embrace learn-

er-centred teaching methodologies that promote deep learning.

While closing the workshop on behalf of the Deputy Director Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, Dr. Marsellah Ogendo challenged the participants to upgrade their skills as health professionals' educators, "The future of this College depends on our capacity as its faculty to improve our skills as facilitators of learning"

This initiative, part of the 2025-2026 Performance Contracting (PC) activities, targets 200 faculty members from across the KMTC campuses. A majority of them were recruited within the last two years. The remaining faculty will be trained between January and March 2026.

College Improves Its Performance Contracting Score for 2024/2025

The College has posted an improved Performance Contracting score for the 2024/2025 financial year, marking yet another milestone in the College's continued pursuit of excellence in training, research, and service delivery.

The evaluation meeting, held at the College headquarters' Boardroom in Nairobi, brought together senior management and departmental heads to review the institution's progress under the 2024/2025 performance cycle. The improved score reflects KMTC's dedication to enhancing institutional efficiency, promoting innovation, and aligning its operations with the government's Digitalisation of Public Services Agenda.

During the review, it was noted that KMTC had made remarkable achievements across several key performance areas. Notably, the College successfully increased enrolments across its campuses in various courses.

In a demonstration of its commitment to innovation and research, KMTC funded 32 research proposals to foster evidence-based practice and translate new ideas into impactful solutions for the health sector.

The College also prioritised curriculum relevance and quality by reviewing industry standards and developing 10 new curricula and training manuals to ensure alignment with current healthcare demands and emerging trends. In line with the government's digital transformation strategy, KMTC

re-engineered its transcript and certificate issuance process and successfully onboarded the service onto the eCitizen platform, significantly improving efficiency, transparency, and the overall quality of service charter delivery.

Further underscoring its commitment to environmental sustainability, the College planted 127,204 trees across the country as part of its environmental conservation and climate action initiatives.

The evaluation committee commended the College for its strong performance trajectory and encouraged continued investment in digital systems, research capacity-building, and sustainable practices to strengthen institutional impact further.

Clinical Officers Council Surveillance Audit Gives KMTC a Clean Bill of Health

The College's Clinical Medicine and Surgery programme has received a clean bill of health from the Clinical Officers Council (COC) following the completion of a surveillance audit on November 25, 2025. This surveillance audit was part of ongoing

national initiatives to guarantee that Clinical Officers receive high-quality training that meets both professional and academic standards.

During the exercise, the audit team examined several key aspects of the training programme. They evaluated how effectively the Clinical Medicine curriculum is delivered, reviewed academic procedures, assessed the hands-on clinical experience students receive, and examined the overall learning environment. Their goal was to ensure that KMTC continues to align its training programmes with regulatory standards and the constantly evolving needs of the healthcare sector.

When she received the team in her office on behalf of the CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Deputy Director Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, welcomed the initiative, terming it a significant step forward in KMTC's continued pursuit of excellence in health sciences education. "The College appreciates the collaboration with the COC to strengthen the training of Clinical Officers in its campuses countrywide," she said. Dr. Nyawira noted that such partnerships are crucial for supporting the national goal of Universal Health Coverage by producing skilled, ethical, and compassionate healthcare providers ready to serve their communities.

The head of training at COC, Ms. Eu-

nice Kuria, expressed her approval of the College's performance, stating that the audit reinforced the institution's firm adherence to the necessary regulatory standards for training Clinical Officers. "KMTC plays a key role as a benchmark for excellence in clinical training thanks to its consistent accountability," she noted.

This audit is part of a broader quality assurance initiative covering all 42 KMTC campuses accredited to train Clinical Officers. It emphasises the Colleges essential role in strengthening Kenya's healthcare workforce and its dedication to graduating students who are prepared to meet the evolving needs of the health sector.

College Meeting with Canadian Delegation Brings New Hope for Jobs

For every graduating student, the question remains: "What comes after graduation?"

The College is tackling this age-old question by actively forming partnerships that create access to global employment opportunities.

As part of this effort, the College has begun discussions with the Canadian NGO Tri-County Mennonite Homes (TCMH) in collaboration with Talent Beyond Borders (TBB).

This strategic initiative was formalised during an inaugural meeting at the KMTC headquarters on November 4, 2025, where CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch welcomed a delegation led by TCMH's CEO, Mr Steven Harrison.

The meeting also included representatives from the Ministry of Labour, the National Employment Authority, and

Refugee Point.

The purpose of the visit was to lay the groundwork for a collaborative agreement to recruit KMTC graduates for placements and job opportunities in Canada.

This initiative seeks to address the persistent issue of youth unemployment by directly connecting KMTC's large talent pool with a high-demand international market.

The partnership plans to begin by recruiting nurses and gradually include other professions, such as Emergency Medical Technicians, Radiographers, Healthcare Assistants, and Physiotherapists.

TCMH CEO Mr. Harrison, speaking during the meeting, acknowledged that with an ageing population in Canada, KMTC is strategically positioned to train healthcare professionals who can provide essential care.

He expressed his admiration for the College's long history and the data that support its status as the best middle-level medical training institution in East and Central Africa.

Dr. Oluoch welcomed the partnership, terming it a "watershed moment" for KMTC graduates.

"Partnerships like this one will transform our students from local graduates into globally competitive profession-

als," he stated.

The CEO expressed the College's commitment to producing high-quality graduates, noting that it is actively investing in the latest training equipment.

Echoing Dr. Oluoch's sentiments, Deputy Director, Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, assured the TCMH team that all KMTC courses are accredited by the relevant bodies, ensuring that the College's graduates are highly qualified.

The discussions are very timely, as the College plans to hold its 94th graduation ceremony on December 4, 2025, at which more than 22,000 students will officially enter the job market.

Strengthening East-West African Health Relations as KMTC Concludes Key Meeting with Angola Delegation

KMTC reinforced its position as a regional leader in health workforce development as the strategic meeting with the Angolan delegation concluded, highlighting a commitment to cross-border cooperation. The discussions, led by Board Chairperson, Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, at the College's headquarters in Nairobi, successfully outlined the scope of collaboration under the existing Government-to-Government Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). The delegation arrived in Kenya on December 5, 2025, kicking off a four-day visit to key health facilities.

The Board Chair expressed KMTC's readiness to assist Angola in strengthening its health system, stating, "The College is ready to walk with you and engage with agreements within our purview. We are prepared to support you by receiving your students or sending our trainers." He emphasised that this partnership has the Board's approval and is committed to direct engagement to identify Angola's specific needs.

In his response, the Angolan head of delegation, National Director Ex-

change Programmes and International Relations at the Angolan Ministry of Health, Dr Julio Carvalho, expressed his gratitude: "Thank you for the way you have received us. Being accepted at the highest level of Kenya's health system, the Ministry of Health, was such an honour, and we are happy that Kenya is ready to support us." They acknowledged the excellent training at KMTC and the robust healthcare system built by the Kenyan government.

Anticipating the deployment of their first group of students in March 2026, the Angolan team submitted essential logistical requests, seeking clarity that would enable their students to integrate smoothly into the College's training.

In response, KMTC DDFP&A, Ms Lucy Chebungei, reaffirmed the College's commitment, assuring the Angolan delegation that support is available "from the MOH to the Board and Management to the campus."

Enhancing the research aspect of the partnership, Deputy Director of Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, welcomed Angola's interest in collaborative research, affirming: "The College

is ready to collaborate on research in response to the Angolan delegation's request for research partnership."

Further reinforcing KMTC's readiness, Head of Intergovernmental Relations, Dr. Leah Bii, confirmed the development of a comprehensive framework to support Angolan professionals. "We will develop a package for your technicians to equate them with ours and allow them to undertake training in various specialisations," she noted.

The meeting also benefited from insights from the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council (KMP-DC) Corporation Secretary and Legal Services Manager, Mr Michael Onyango, who provided a regulatory body perspective. He highlighted the role of the Association of Medical Councils of Africa (AMCOA) in facilitating knowledge transfer and supporting harmonised health training standards across the continent.

KMTC continues to demonstrate institutional commitment, establishing Kenya as a strategic African partner capable of leveraging its medical education expertise.

Registration Opens for World AIDS Day 2025 Half Marathon to Boost Kenya's HIV Response

On November 15, 2025, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch joined a delegation led by the Principal Secretary for Medical Services, Dr. Ouma Oluga, at the College Headquarters to officially launch the registration for the World AIDS Day 2025 Half Marathon.

The launch marked the beginning of national preparations for this year's World AIDS Day celebrations, which will take place on November 30, 2025, at Nyayo Stadium in Nairobi. Organised by the National Syndemic Diseases Control Council (NSDCC), the event calls on Kenyans to register, participate, and support the national fight against Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) as the country intensifies efforts to end Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) as a public health threat by 2030.

During the event, Dr. Oluga highlighted the rising vulnerability of young people, noting that 41 percent of new HIV infections occur among adolescents and youth aged 15 to 24 years. He also warned of a growing "triple threat" facing this age group, comprising rising HIV infections, an estimated 250,000 teenage pregnancies recorded annually, and over 5,000 cases of gender-based injuries.

Dr. Oluga further outlined the government's strengthened measures to enhance the national HIV response, including sustainable financing for HIV programmes, a new Kenya-US partnership framework, operationalisation of the Social Health Authority, integration of key health services, and continued investment in essential commodities and laboratory systems. He

reaffirmed the government's commitment to coordinated action, stronger health systems, and safeguarding the progress made as Kenya accelerates efforts to end AIDS.

In his remarks, Dr. Oluoch reaffirmed KMTC's commitment to advancing national health priorities, noting that, as the leading trainer of health-care professionals in the region, the College will continue to champion initiatives that strengthen prevention, promote public health awareness, and build community resilience. He emphasised that KMTC's mission, to develop competent, compassionate, and community-responsive health professionals, remains central to supporting multi-sectoral efforts to end HIV and improve the overall well-being of Kenyans.

KMTC Joins National World AIDS Day Marathon, Rallying Youth to End AIDS by 2030

On November 30, 2025, the Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) demonstrated its strong commitment to public health advocacy by participating in the National World AIDS Day Marathon at Nyayo National Stadium. The vibrant event brought together over 500 students and staff from Nairobi, Mathare, Karen, Manza, and Machakos campuses under the theme "One Race, One Goal – End AIDS by 2030 and End the Triple Threat."

The occasion was graced by the Principal Secretary, State Department for Public Health and Professional Standards, Mary Muthoni, who led national calls for intensified youth engagement in the fight against HIV, teenage pregnancies, and gender-based violence. She was accompanied by a KMTC delegation led by the Deputy Director, Finance, Planning and Administration, Ms. Lucy Chebungei, who represented

the CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch. The delegation also included the Resource Mobilisation Manager, Mr. Job Nyakado, Ag. Administrative Services Manager, Dr. Pricillah Anuri, and Head of Clinical Services, Dr. Kennedy Rateng.

Addressing participants, the PS commended the energy and passion displayed by young people and emphasised the critical role of academic institutions in driving health advocacy and behavioural change. "Today, we run not only for fitness, but for something bigger than ourselves," she stated, urging youth to take ownership of their health choices and become champions of change within their communities. She further acknowledged KMTC's leadership, noting, "Your presence here today signifies that the next generation of healthcare professionals is ready to lead the fight against AIDS and safeguard the well-being of our nation."

In her remarks, Ms. Chebungei reaffirmed KMTC's unwavering commitment to health promotion and youth empowerment.

"KMTC students are the face of Kenya's health future, and today they have demonstrated leadership beyond the classroom. Every step in this marathon is a move towards ending AIDS, reducing adolescent vulnerability, and building communities that are informed, empowered, and protected," she said, adding that the College will continue to champion public health advocacy with passion and purpose.

The National Syndemic Diseases Control Council (NSDCC) CEO, Dr. Douglas Bosire, lauded the impressive turnout, highlighting the central role of young adults in advancing awareness and prevention efforts. "World AIDS Day reminds us that every step counts. By showing up in such great numbers, especially students and young professionals in training, we are proving that

Kenya is firmly on the path toward ending AIDS by 2030,” he noted. Beyond the marathon, participants benefited from free health services, including blood pressure checks, dental assessments, eye examinations, HIV testing, and cervical cancer screening. KMTC campuses countrywide also marked the day through community walks and free medical camps, amplifying the national call for awareness,

prevention, and early intervention. For KMTC students, the event provided a platform to actively engage in advocacy and community service as future healthcare professionals. According to NSDCC data, Kenya recorded nearly 20,000 new HIV infections in 2024, marking a 19% increase from the previous year, with over 3,000 cases in Nairobi County alone. An estimated 1.3 million Kenyans are

currently living with HIV, and young people aged 15–34 account for the majority of new infections, highlighting the urgency of sustained youth-focused interventions. These sobering statistics highlight why initiatives such as the World AIDS Day Marathon, anchored in education, engagement, and action, remain critical in Kenya’s journey toward an AIDS-free generation.

College Strengthens Global Partnerships Ahead of 94th Graduation Ceremony

The College, on November 13, 2025, hosted a delegation from the Ministry of Health, led by the Director of Health Sector Coordination and Research, Dr. Omar Ahmed, to lay the groundwork for an upcoming visit by an Angolan delegation scheduled for December 4 to 8, 2025.

The discussions, chaired by CEO, Dr Kelly Oluoch, represented by the Deputy Director, Finance, Planning and Administration, Ms. Lucy Chebungei, focused on deepening collaboration between Kenya and Angola in health workforce training and development.

With a Government-to-Government Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) already in place, the meeting aimed to prepare for the upcoming visit by identifying key sites for the delegation to tour that showcase the country's robust healthcare training and service delivery system.

The Angolan delegation's visit follows a similar engagement in October 2023, when a joint team from Kenya, comprising Ministry of Health officials and a KMTC delegation led by the Board of Directors, visited Angola to explore areas of mutual interest and establish pathways for collaboration in healthcare training and capacity development.

Notably, the Angolan delegation will be among the guests at the KMTC 94th Graduation Ceremony, where the College will graduate over 22,000 well-trained, fit-for-purpose healthcare professionals into the workforce. The ceremony offers the visiting team a firsthand look at Kenya's robust medical training model and its contribution to the health sector.

Speaking during the meeting, Ms Chebungei highlighted the College's strengths, noting that a collaboration

with Angola would represent "a new level of partnership that blends diplomacy, shared growth, and practical co-operation in healthcare training."

Angola, with a population of over 36 million, continues to invest in rebuilding and expanding its healthcare sector. Kenya, through KMTC, is strategically positioned to support this effort by leveraging its extensive experience in training health professionals and strengthening primary health systems across the region.

As KMTC prepares to celebrate its 94th graduation and host the Angolan delegation, it continues to strengthen Kenya's standing as a leader in health education, innovation, and cross-border cooperation, cultivating a workforce ready to transform health systems both locally and globally.

Labour Mobility and Global Partnerships Ahead of the 94th Graduation Ceremony

As the College prepares for its 94th Graduation Ceremony on December 4, 2025, at the Moi International Sports Centre, Kasarani, the College continues to expand international partnerships to create global employment pathways for its graduates.

KMTC Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, on November 11, 2025, hosted a delegation from the Government of Canada - New Brunswick Province at the Headquarters for high-level discussions on potential collaboration to boost healthcare labour provision and address workforce gaps

in the Canadian health sector.

During the meeting, Dr. Oluoch reaffirmed KMTC's commitment to producing competent, adaptable, and globally competitive healthcare professionals, noting that the College's graduates are well-prepared to serve both locally and internationally. He further highlighted that over 22,000 graduands will be conferred with various certificates, diplomas, and higher diplomas during the upcoming graduation, a testament to KMTC's critical role in sustaining Kenya's healthcare workforce.

Speaking on behalf of the Canadian Government, Mr. Dany Couillard expressed appreciation for KMTC's quality training standards and commitment to healthcare excellence. He reported that New Brunswick faces a growing healthcare labour shortage, with 65 percent of its population elderly, underscoring the urgent need for skilled health professionals to support its health system. Mr. Couillard described the potential partnership as a "strategic pathway towards strengthening healthcare delivery through skilled international collaboration."

In line with its global focus, KMTC has also introduced foreign-language training into its curriculum to prepare students for cross-cultural engagement and international healthcare practice. This initiative ensures that graduates are equipped not only with technical expertise but also with the communication skills required to thrive in diverse healthcare environments.

As KMTC marks nearly a century of transformative health training, the College remains steadfast in its mission to enhance labour mobility, strengthen global partnerships, and ensure that every graduate is both employable and impactful in advancing healthcare outcomes worldwide.

College Explores Labour Migration Collaboration with Paramedic Association of New Brunswick, Canada

He emphasized that aligning KMTC's programmes with the Canadian healthcare system would help meet the growing demand for qualified health workers in Canada.

"Canada has an aging population and an increasing shortage of healthcare providers. We are keen on building a partnership with the Kenyan Government and KMTC to tap into Kenya's

highly skilled health workforce," he said.

He further highlighted PANB's readiness to support curriculum review efforts and contribute to faculty empowerment as a strategy to strengthen training outcomes.

Representing the CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Deputy Director, Academics, Dr. Nyawira Mwangi, welcomed the engagement, terming it a significant milestone in expanding job opportunities for Kenyan youth while contributing meaningfully to Canada's health service delivery.

During the visit, Mr. Cassista and his team toured the Skills Laboratory, Simulation Lab, and several classrooms. They interacted with students who demonstrated their competencies, leaving the delegation impressed by the high standards of training and professionalism displayed by KMTC Emer-

gency Medical Technician (EMT) students.

The proposed collaboration marks a promising step towards strengthening global partnerships and expanding international career pathways for KMTC students.

Mr. Cassista was accompanied by Ms. Sharon Rebecca and Mr. Nelson Rono from the Ministry of Labour and Social Protection, Directorate of Labour Migration and Management.

Also present during the meeting were Canadian High Commission representative Mr. Kelvin Murerwa; KMTC Deputy Registrars Ms. Lucy Kuria (Quality Assurance), Ms. Grace Mwangi (Student Affairs), Mr. Felix Mutua (Head of Department, Clinical Medicine); Nairobi Campus Deputy Principals, Ms. Carolyne Oyugi (Finance and Administration); and Mr. Willy Bett (Academics).

KMTC Equips Students with New Skills to Create Jobs in the Health Sector

KMTC has begun training its students and alumni to strengthen their careers, increase their employability, and open new opportunities outside traditional hospital roles.

With youth unemployment rising worldwide, the College is focusing on practical skills to support job creation

and business innovation in the health sector.

Through a partnership with Amref Health Africa in Kenya under the Learning for Life programme, more than 80,000 KMTC students will receive training in health entrepreneurship.

CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch said the programme aims to help students discover opportunities beyond hospital walls and build services such as community health initiatives, wellness programmes, telehealth solutions, diagnostic ventures, and health education services.

“The College will establish an incubation centre at the Nairobi Campus where students can present their ideas and receive support to develop, test, and grow them,” he noted.

To launch this effort, the College trained 200 faculty members in Nakuru and Nairobi.

Resource Mobilisation Manager Mr. Job Nyakado said the weeklong training, which began on December 8, 2025, will also be available on the eLearning platform so that alumni can benefit.

This initiative comes at a time when health entrepreneurship is expanding

globally.

Young innovators are introducing health technology solutions, community clinics, digital health platforms, mobile laboratories, and wellness hubs that respond to real health needs.

In India, youth-founded platforms such as Practo and 1mg now serve millions of people and employ thousands across the health value chain.

In Nigeria, LifeBank has changed how hospitals receive blood and emergency supplies, creating work in logistics, technology, and clinical support.

Kenya is also seeing steady growth, with companies such as Ilara Health,

MyDawa, and Ponea Health opening new opportunities for laboratory technologists, clinicians, pharmacists, and digital health specialists.

Across Africa and beyond, young people are establishing clinics, wellness centres, telemedicine platforms, home-care services, and community outreach programmes that expand access to care and create employment.

KMTC’s training programme places its students at the heart of this growing global movement by giving them the tools, mentors, and opportunities they need to build meaningful careers and shape the future of healthcare.

Accelerating Safer Roads Through Lifesaving Skills

The College, on November 13, 2025, took a significant step toward strengthening emergency response and road safety in Kenya during a high-level consultative meeting held at a Hotel in Nairobi. The engagement, attended by representatives of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), road safety stakeholders, and KMTC officials, centred on the College’s Boda Boda First Responder Training Initiative, a country-wide programme transforming riders into lifesavers.

KMTC CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch highlighted the vital role of boda boda riders as first responders, especially in areas where emergency services are delayed. With over 1.5 million riders nationwide and motorcycle-related crashes accounting for 33% of road fatalities in 2024, KMTC stressed the importance of equipping riders with essential emergency care skills.

“Who reaches the injured before the ambulance arrives?” Dr. Oluoch posed the question, noting that boda boda riders are often the first on the scene but lack the basic life-saving skills that could prevent avoidable deaths.

Over the years, the College has trained more than 9,000 riders across 90 campuses, offering practical skills such as bleeding control, safe lifting techniques, chest compressions, choking response, and scene management. The College has also integrated first aid and trauma management into all its academic programmes, ensuring that every KMTC graduate has lifesaving skills.

The meeting acknowledged key challenges, including funding gaps that limit national scaling. To train 10,000 additional riders, KMTC requires Kshs.

14 million, excluding monitoring and evaluation costs. However, stakeholders agreed that the programme remains one of the most cost-effective investments in reducing preventable deaths, costing just Kshs. 1,400 per rider for a two-day course.

Dr. Oluoch called on partners to support the next phase of the programme, saying, “KMTC brings the expertise, infrastructure, and credibility to transform community response, not as a project, but as a system.”

New Laisamis Maternity Wing Expands Training Opportunities for KMTC Students

KMTC Marsabit has received a significant boost in its training capacity following the commissioning of a new ultra-modern maternity wing at Laisamis Hospital on November 13, 2025.

As a clinical training site for Marsabit Campus students pursuing Nursing, Clinical Medicine, and Community Health Assistant programmes, the expanded facility now offers an improved environment for hands-on learning, an essential component of producing skilled, practice-ready health professionals for Marsabit County and beyond.

The new 28-bed maternity wing, complete with a dedicated surgical theatre, neonatal unit, ultrasound capability, and reliable power backup, will significantly widen the range of clinical cases and procedures accessible to students. This translates into richer clinical rotations, more opportunities to develop critical competencies, and a stronger pipeline of health workers able to respond effectively to maternal and newborn health needs in the region.

Speaking during the ceremony, the Campus Principal, Dr. Agnes Li-

nus, emphasised that the investment comes at a time when the Campus is strengthening its academic and practical training programmes. With about 300 students currently enrolled, the new maternity wing supports KMTC's mission to produce competent health workers who can serve in every corner of the vast county. She added, "For Marsabit Campus, this investment means more than improved infrastructure; it means better learning, better skills, and ultimately better healthcare for our people. Our students will now train in an environment that reflects the standards we aspire to deliver across the county."

Dr. Linus took the opportunity to request hostel facilities for KMTC students undertaking clinical rotations in Laisamis. In response, Deputy Governor Solomon Riwe committed to taking up the matter under the county's Affordable Housing Programme, acknowledging the need to support student welfare to maximise their training outcomes.

Further strengthening the College's role in expanding local access to training, Dr. Linus outlined the minimum

entry requirements for KMTC programmes and pledged to set up a dedicated application desk with an officer to assist potential students in Laisamis. The area MCA, Daniel Burcha, assured the community that he would follow up to ensure that qualified youths applied and took advantage of KMTC opportunities.

Safaricom's Mr. Patrick Mburu, a key partner behind the maternity wing's construction, acknowledged the strong partnership with KMTC, remarking that their role is to complement the College's work. "We provide the infrastructure; KMTC provides the human resources for health. Together, we strengthen healthcare for this region," he said.

County Executive Committee Member for Health, Malicha Boru, highlighted that Marsabit County invested Kshs. 45 million in Laisamis Hospital during the last financial year alone. With the hospital steadily advancing toward Level IV status, The College stands to benefit even further as clinical training becomes more robust and diversified.

Hospital Expansion set to Enhance Clinical Training Opportunities for Students

KMTC Eldoret stands to benefit from one of the region's most significant health infrastructure projects following the groundbreaking of the new 2,000-bed Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital (MTRH) facility in Kiplombe, Uasin Gishu County.

The event, held on November 17, 2025, brought together national and county leaders, including the Cabinet Secretary for Health, Hon. Aden Duale, alongside the KMTC Board Chairperson, Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch. Eldoret Campus staff and students also joined the ceremony.

Hon. Duale highlighted the government's focus on strengthening medical training institutions and referral systems, calling the project "a cornerstone of Kenya's future health security and service excellence."

KMTC Board Chairperson, Mr. Cheruiyot, speaking on the importance of the partnership between the hospital and the College, reiterated: "Our collaboration with MTRH has always been central to producing highly skilled graduates. This new facility will elevate the training experience and ensure our students are ready to serve in any setting across the region and the continent."

CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch highlighted the strategic significance of the development, noting: "This expansion strengthens Kenya's capacity to train a healthcare workforce capable of meet-

ing future demands. KMTC students will greatly benefit from exposure to a modern, high-capacity hospital built to international standards."

Later in the day, the Chairperson and CEO visited KMTC Eldoret, met with staff and students, and reaffirmed KMTC's commitment to strengthening teaching, clinical training, and service delivery through strategic partnerships such as the one with MTRH.

Once completed, the new MTRH complex, expected to accommodate 4,000 beds, will expand access to spe-

cialised healthcare services. For KMTC Eldoret, it represents a significant leap forward in the training environment available to students.

The expansion comes at a strategic time for KMTC, just days before the College's 94th Graduation Ceremony, where over 22,000 health professionals are set to join the workforce.

The MTRH development aligns with national goals to build a stronger, well-trained workforce capable of supporting Kenya's Universal Health Coverage agenda.

Eldoret Campus Boosts Ophthalmic Training with Ksh 2.7 million Equipment Donation from Fred Hollows Foundation

Eldoret Campus is set to significantly enhance its ophthalmic training capacity following the donation of specialised training equipment worth Ksh 2.7 million from the Fred Hollows Foundation Kenya (FHK). The equipment, officially handed over on December 17, 2025, marks a major milestone in strengthening hands-on clinical training for Ophthalmic Clinical Officers.

The donation comprises critical ophthalmic training tools, including retinoscopes, direct and indirect ophthalmoscopes, retraction boxes, and cataract surgery sets, to improve the quality, scope, and relevance of practical learning. This investment is expected to directly enhance students' competencies and improve the delivery of eye care services in the country.

Representing CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, Eldoret Campus Principal Mr. Daniel Kimwetich described the donation as a transformative step for ophthalmic training. "This support will significantly strengthen our capacity to deliver world-class ophthalmic training and ensure our learners acquire practical, industry-relevant skills," he said, adding that the partnership is central to advancing the College's mission of producing highly skilled and competent healthcare professionals.

Mr. Kimwetich further reaffirmed the College's commitment to strategic partnerships, revealing plans to establish a state-of-the-art ophthalmology training centre at the Eldoret Campus through continued collaboration with FHK. "This equipment will greatly enhance hands-on training and ensure our graduates are well prepared to meet the growing and evolving needs of the eye-health sector," he noted.

Speaking on behalf of FHK, Mr. Milo highlighted the Foundation's over-decade-long partnership with KMTC, which has supported skills laboratories, faculty development, and the training of hundreds of mid-level eye-health professionals nationwide. "We remain committed to expanding learning infrastructure at Eldoret and Nakuru campuses, with Nakuru identified as a future centre of excellence in ophthalmology training," he stated, underscoring FHK's long-term investment in Kenya's eye-care workforce.

KMTC Ophthalmology Coordinator Ms. Caroline Tanui termed the donation both timely and impactful, noting that it aligns with shared institutional

goals. "This collaboration reflects our joint commitment to fighting avoidable blindness by equipping our trainees with modern tools and competencies that meet global standards," she said.

In a further demonstration of partnership, KMTC has provided office space at the Eldoret Campus to host FHK's North Rift regional operations enhancing coordination, outreach, and regional impact.

Following the handover ceremony, the delegation toured the ophthalmology classroom, library, and skills laboratory housed in the campus' new academic complex, which is set to be fully equipped by FHK.

Through such high-impact partnerships, the College continues to strengthen ophthalmic training, expand institutional capacity, and contribute meaningfully to developing a skilled, fit-for-purpose healthcare workforce, thereby advancing equitable access to quality eye care services across Kenya.

Medical Camp Restores Hope and Dignity: Brings Life-Saving Care to Thousands

The curtain has fallen on the seventh Ndhiwa Annual Medical Camp, held from November 22 -23, 2025, marking yet another milestone in bringing quality healthcare closer to the people. Residents of the Ndhiwa community have a renewed reason to smile as the two-day outreach, hosted at the Ndhiwa Campus, brought critical medical services to their doorsteps at absolutely no cost.

The camp recorded an impressive turnout, with over 3,000 patients receiving treatment. Additionally, more than 200 patients were referred to various health facilities for advanced or specialised care, ensuring a continuum of support beyond the event.

The Chief Guest, Health Cabinet Secretary Hon. Aden Duale, represented by the Director General of Health, Dr. Patrick Amoth, praised the initiative's consistency. "This initiative is more than service; it is dignity restored. Seeing worry turn into relief is

the true meaning of Universal Health Coverage," Dr. Amoth said. He applauded the organisers for sustaining the camp for seven years, adding, "This shows deep love and commitment to the well-being of Ndhiwa. This is how communities thrive."

Dr. Amoth also emphasised the need to intensify the fight against HIV/AIDS and urged residents to take advantage of the Social Health Authority (SHA) membership to secure their long-term health coverage.

Presiding over the closing ceremony, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch applauded the collaboration that made the camp a success. He highlighted significant infrastructural developments aimed at boosting the capacity of the Ndhiwa Campus. "I want to sincerely applaud the NG-CDF Ndhiwa for standing with Ndhiwa Campus. We are grateful to the government for allocating Kshs. 30 million towards the construction of a new tuition block." Dr. Oluoch re-

ported that KMTC is also constructing 580 affordable student hostels, which will significantly expand access to training.

The CEO further urged parents and guardians to utilise the Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service (KUCCPS) to enrol their children in the College.

Accompanying the CEO, Ndhiwa MP Hon. Martin Peters Owino reaffirmed the NG-CDF's continued support for the institution's growth. "The partnership between the NG-CDF and KMTC is a great blessing, not just to the institution but to the entire community. We will continue supporting the Campus because when the College grows, Ndhiwa grows," the MP stated.

Hon. Owino also expressed gratitude to the KMTC leadership for securing essential logistical support, specifically a bus and a double-cabin vehicle, noting that these resources would enhance teaching and learning and future community outreach activities.

For many of these residents, the medical camp, a partnership of Ndhiwa NG-CDF, the Homa Bay County Government, KMTC, and other partners, was a rare opportunity to access critical health services.

This multi-agency collaboration ensured that ailments that may have gone untreated for months were finally addressed with the dignity and professional care that every citizen deserves, serving as a critical lifeline for the community's most vulnerable members.

KMTC conducted comprehensive training for Board Directors, Management and Campus Principals on the Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) and Electronic Government Procurement (EGP) systems, in line with national and global best practices in institutional governance and digital transformation, from November 24–28, 2025, in Mombasa.

The training was officially opened by the Deputy Director, Finance, Planning and Administration, Ms. Lucy Chebungei, and formally closed by the Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Kelly Oluoch. The ERP component covered key functional areas, including student management, student academics, timetabling, asset management, digital approvals, and the accommodation module. This has equipped Principals with enhanced capacity to digitally manage student records, academic processes, timetables, institutional assets, and student accommodation, in line with modern higher education management standards.

Participants were also sensitised on the Electronic Government Procurement system, introducing them to the new e-procurement framework that aligns KMTC with Government directives and public sector procurement regulations. Adoption of the EGP platform is expected to strengthen transparency, accountability, and compliance in line with public procurement and financial management best practices.

Speaking during the closing session, Dr Oluoch reaffirmed the College's commitment to automation and efficiency, noting: "This training is a critical step in entrenching digital systems that enhance transparency, reduce turnaround time, and ensure that our students, staff, and stakeholders receive timely, high-quality services." He further emphasised that fully leveraging ERP and EGP will support KMTC's Strategic Plan by improving service delivery and strengthening internal controls.

In her opening remarks, Ms. Chebungei underscored the importance

of leadership ownership in successful systems implementation. "As Campus Principals, you are the stewards of these systems on the front line. Effective use of ERP and EGP will minimise waste, improve planning, and ensure that every shilling and every process adds value to our core mandate, training competent health professionals," she said.

The training also provided a platform to strengthen collaboration among Principals, promote peer learning, and reinforce KMTC's commitment to digital transformation, improved service delivery, and robust institutional governance. Once the ERP and EGP systems are fully implemented across all campuses, the College anticipates reduced inefficiencies, less wastage, and more effective and efficient service provision to students and stakeholders.
