On behalf of the Ministry of Health, it is my honor to preside over the graduation of 12,621 graduands on this 87<sup>th</sup> occasion of the Kenya Medical Training College's (KMTC's) Annual Graduation Ceremony.

Adequate, skilled and fairly distributed Human Resource for Health (HRH) is a prerequisite for the attainment of Universal Health Coverage (UHC), Vision 2030 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The Constitution of Kenya (2010), mandates the Ministry of Health to provide leadership in the Health Sector through policy formulation and training of health care professional. Kenya has a health care workers population ratio of 15: 10,000 against a World Health Organization (WHO) prescribed ratio of 23: 10,000. To increase the number of health care workers in the Country, the Ministry of Health, through KMTC, has set up additional 43 Campuses increasing the number from 28 in 2013 to 71 across the country. Today's graduation of 12,621 students is a milestone towards realizing optimal health worker to population ratio.

The Ministry of Health is exploring other measures to mitigate the gaps in HRH in the country including a collegiate health care workers training system in our health facilities to complement the ongoing trainings in medical schools so as to achieve the desirable health workforce in the country in the shortest time possible.

Established in 1927, KMTC remains the lead-trainer in the medical field producing over 85% of middle level health professionals for the local health sector. KMTC graduates are highly sought after and work in far off countries in the USA, Canada, Australia, the UK, other Western Countries, Middle East and in Africa, just to mention but a few.

Bridging the human resource for health gaps in the country requires a concerted effort involving all stakeholders. The Board, with support from National and County governments as well as other development partners has continued to expand training opportunities at the College to address the human resource for health needs in the country.

In line with the Governments Universal Health Coverage (UHC) goals and the Boards transformative agenda, the College has started 43 new campuses, increasing the number from 28 in 2013 to 71 in 2019. Our campuses are strategically placed adjacent to referral

hospitals thus providing human resource to over 450 hospitals, which are our clinical training sites.

As a result of this expansion, in the 2018/19 academic year the College admitted 12,942 new students, growing the student population to over 41,000 in 2019. The number of graduands has also increased over the years. This year, the College is releasing 12,621 graduands compared to 10,689 in 2018. In the next four years, KMTC plans to produce over 50,000 graduates to support the government's agenda of achieving UHC for all Kenyans by 2022.

The College shall continue to mount need-based and community-oriented training programs to support the Government fulfill its mandate of providing equitable health care.
