KMTC Partners in National Social Health Authority Rollout, Takes on Key Role

he College has been designated to play a central role in the nationwide rollout of the Social Health Authority (SHA) program, a key initiative in Kenya's healthcare reform. The SHA program, set to replace the National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF), is aimed at improving access to affordable, high-quality healthcare services for all citizens.

KMTC, led by CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch, has been tasked with spearheading the implementation of this transformative initiative in Kisumu and Homa Bay Counties. The College's role involves raising awareness and mobilizing local communities to embrace the initiative, which is expected to significantly advance Kenya's Universal Health Coverage goals.

To build capacity within the KMTC community and ensure active participation in the program, a sensitization forum facilitated by top officials from SHA was held on September 29, 2024. This forum brought together key leaders from the KMTC fraternity, equipping them with knowledge on the SHA program and highlighting their critical role in its

successful rollout. Dr. Oluoch emphasized the importance of internal preparedness, stating, "This is a transformative program, and its success relies on the commitment of every stakeholder, including our KMTC staff and students, who will play a frontline role in its implementation."

In addition to these efforts, the College has introduced a Diploma in Health Insurance Management, specifically designed to equip healthcare professionals with the skills needed to manage the new health financing scheme. This program aligns with the broader SHA goals by ensuring that healthcare workers are prepared to navigate and implement the new system effectively.

The SHA initiative is expected to make healthcare more affordable, accessible, and equitable for all Kenyans, contributing to the country's UHC agenda. By taking on a leadership role in the rollout, KMTC is positioning itself as a key player in shaping the future of healthcare in Kenya, further cementing its status as a leader in healthcare training and innovation.

Q&A with Deputy Director (Academics) Dr. Nyawira Mwangi

i. What is your story?

As the academic and research lead at KMTC, I support students and faculty in fulfilling the College's mandate. My background as a doctor, research scientist, and educator, along with my interest in leadership and management in health, enriches my role. In 2022, I was awarded a Fellow of Health Systems Management (FeHSM), bringing unique personal values and knowledge to my work.

ii. How do you balance work and personal life, and what hobbies do you enjoy outside of KMTC?

Achieving academic goals requires meeting numerous targets each year. My team has consistently scored very well on all performance metrics. Despite our busy schedule, we prioritize occasional office celebrations, such as monthly cake gatherings to recognize outstanding achievements. I enjoy visiting our campuses, sharing meals with frontline teams, and engaging in cultural experiences, including museums, indigenous sites, and bookstores. My hobbies include painting, weaving, and hosting guests. I also contribute to farming and philanthropy, and serve as a guest lecturer at University College London and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Additionally, as an ordained pastor, I dedicate time to ministry and church administration, balancing work with annual family vacations.

To manage these various responsibilities, I utilize strategies from personal effectiveness books like The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen Covey, and Developing the Leader Within You by John Maxwell. I am an avid reader and participate in two book clubs.

iii. What is the function and responsibilities of your office?

The Deputy Director of Academics (DDA) oversees activities related to achieving the College's core mandate as outlined in the Kenya Medical Training Act. Responsibilities include curriculum development, campus and department establishment, academic calendar management, recruitment and admissions, teaching and learning, quality assurance, research, student experience, assessments, examinations, and graduation.



iv. What is your

leadership philosophy?

Leadership is essential in medical practice. Throughout my career, I have led various professional associations and editorial boards. Currently, I co-lead a National Institutes of Health (NIH)-funded multi-country study focused on artificial intelligence for early detection of retinal diseases. My leadership philosophy emphasizes empowering team members, removing barriers, and creating opportunities for growth. I strive for value-based, servant, and transformational leadership, ensuring that we lead with clear values.

v. What strategies does KMTC use to enhance academic excellence?

Our Strategic Plan for 2023-2028 outlines our commitment to six areas: People (students, staff, stakeholders), Programmes (academic and mentorship programs), Place (learning spaces), Processes (quality assurance and accreditation), Partnerships (with communities and health facilities), and Products (innovative training and research). Our vision is to become globally competitive through these strategies.

vi. What role does continuous professional development play at KMTC?

In the fast-evolving field of health and medicine, continu-

ous professional development is crucial. Knowledge decays quickly, making it essential for health workers to learn how to learn. KMTC emphasizes transformative education, encouraging students and faculty to engage in critical thinking and lifelong learning. We offer accredited courses and will focus on emergency care skills, global health, and transferable skills in the upcoming academic year.

vii. What impactful research initiatives are underway at KMTC?

We are engaged in several collaborative research projects. Our journal, the KMTC International Journal of Health Professions, publishes findings from various studies. Ongoing projects include cost-of-programs studies and randomized controlled trials on patient-centered care. For collaborative research opportunities, contact research@kmtc.ac.ke.

viii. What challenges have you faced in aligning academic programs with the healthcare landscape?

The rapid advancements in healthcare often outpace educational progress. To address this, we have prioritized digital transformation and developed a digital literacy module available on our eLearning platform. Collaborations with health facilities implementing telemedicine and artificial intelligence are enhancing our training capabilities.

ix. What personal attributes contribute to your success?

I believe my presence at KMTC is a divine assignment. Scriptures from Romans and Colossians inspire me to serve wholeheartedly. I value time management and stewardship of resources, aiming to close the know-do gap in health professions education. Reading African literature and autobiographies keeps me grounded.

x. What advice do you have for staff and students at KMTC?

We offer support and mentorship programs to help staff and students contribute meaningfully to KMTC's mission. Upcoming workshops on data analysis and academic writing will further enhance skills. To engage in transformative education, we must be intentional and integrated in our efforts.

xi. What are your proudest moments at KMTC?

I take pride in my research funded by Queen Elizabeth II and my advocacy for universal eye health at the UN. Awards like the Fellow of Health Systems Management (FeHSM) and recognition from Health Systems Management Association (HESMA) inspire me. Leading the development of the KMTC Strategic Plan 2023-28 and witnessing the success of our graduates motivate me immensely.

Staff Retirement Benefits and Pension Schemes: Member Education and Sensitization Training

he College has conducted a nationwide member education and sensitization training to enhance awareness of retirement and pension schemes, as well as the recent developments within the sector.

KMTC operates two pension schemes: the Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS), officially registered as the Kenya Medical Training Staff Retirement Benefits Scheme, and the Defined Contribution Scheme (DCS), registered as the Kenya Medical Training Staff Pension Scheme 2011.

During the training sessions, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Robert Otieno Ndalo, emphasized the Board's commitment to monitoring macroeconomic changes and adjusting investment strategies to capitalize on opportunities while mitigating risks.

The KMTC Board Chairperson, Mr. Joseah K. Cheruiyot, alongside Board Directors Ms. Hardlyne Lusui and Eng. Joseph Atonga - also serving as board of trustees - conveyed a unified message. Led by Mr. Cheruiyot, they assured members of the Board's dedication to safeguarding members' benefits, ensuring financial security in retirement. He announced a significant injection of Kshs. 100 million into the Defined Benefits Scheme and an increase in contribution rates from 20% to 27.6% to address the long-standing deficit, which has been present since 2005. This

marks the first time the deficit is being tackled under the current Board of Directors and Trustees.

KMTC CEO, Dr. Kelly Oluoch, urged members to consider making additional voluntary contributions to enhance their retirement benefits. He highlighted the College's proactive

efforts in addressing the Kshs. 2.113 billion deficit identified in the actuarial valuation report for the DB scheme. "We are committed to supporting our staff's retirement journey by ensuring compliance with contribution remittances," he added.

These educational forums aim to inform members about the performance of the pension schemes, introduce new products, including the Post-Medical Retirement Scheme, and provide guidance on financial planning for retirement.

The first phase of the member education initiative took place at KMTC Kilifi on September 16, 2024, gathering staff from Mombasa, Kilifi, Msambweni, Port Reitz, Voi, Lamu, Kwale, and Taveta campuses. This was followed by a session at KMTC Makindu on the September 18, 2024 which brought together staff from Makindu, Kangundo, Makueni (and Mbuvo as well as Mutyambua satellites), Mbooni and Loitokitok campuses. The third forum was held at KMTC Kitui on September 20, 2024, and included participants from Machakos, Kitui (and Mutomo satellite), Manza, Marsabit, Garissa, Tana River, Mwingi, and Mbooni

campuses.

The latest forums were conducted on September 30, 2024, at KMTC Meru, with staff attending from Embu, Meru, Chuka, Isiolo, Imenti, Maua, and Marsabit campuses. The second phase continued with KMTC Nyeri, Othaya, and Nyandarua campuses meeting in Nyeri on October 2, 2024. On Friday, October 4, 2024, staff from Murang'a, Thika, Kangema, Gatundu (and Matunguru satellite) convened at KMTC Murang'a for their sensitization session.

The third phase is scheduled to take place at KMTC Kisii, Kisumu, and Bungoma on October 14, 16, and 18, 2024, respectively. The fourth phase will be held at KMTC Eldoret, Nakuru, and Nairobi campuses on October 28, 30, and November 1, 2024, respectively.

Additionally, Dr. Oluoch urged the KMTC community to support the nationwide rollout of the Social Health Authority (SHA) program, which will replace the National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF).

He revealed that KMTC has been tasked with leading SHA awareness and mobilization efforts in Kisumu and Homa Bay counties. To prepare for this transition, KMTC has introduced a Diploma in Health Insurance Management to equip the healthcare workforce for the new scheme.

This initiative is expected to significantly advance Kenya's Universal Health Coverage (UHC) goals by making healthcare more affordable, accessible, and high-quality for all citizens.

Quality Training of Health Professionals Towards Realization of VISION 2030

Enhancing Service Delivery Through A Revamped Citizen's Service Delivery Charter And Automation

he College is reinforcing its commitment to efficient, customer-focused service delivery with the ongoing review of its Citizen's Service Delivery Charter. This latest phase of review, concluded on September 27, 2024, in Kisumu, marks a significant step toward improving the efficiency and timeliness of services provided to the public, reflecting the College's dedication to service excellence.

The review was conducted in compliance with Public Service Commission (PSC) recommendations and in response to customer feedback. In addition to meeting PSC requirements, the College undertook this review to ensure alignment with evolving public expectations. This comprehensive review aims to enhance service quality, maintain responsiveness, efficiency, and accountability, while promoting continuous improvement and upholding good governance.

The reviewed Charter will ensure that the College's service standards remain competitive, adaptable, and measurable, in line with customer expectations and regulatory requirements.

Since the previous review in 2021, the College has automated several key services, further demonstrating its commitment to leveraging technology for enhanced service delivery. These improvements are designed to streamline operations and ensure a seamless client experience across the College's campuses.

Speaking at the event, CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch emphasized the importance of the Citizen's Service Delivery Charter as a cornerstone of the College's promise to deliver high-quality services. "This review reaffirms our dedication to providing efficient, customer-centered services to the public," he said. Dr. Oluoch highlighted how the introduction of automation

has transformed service delivery, improving responsiveness and client satisfaction.

The College is now banking on cutting-edge technology to make service access faster and more convenient. Whether through social media, email, phone calls, or in-person visits, clients can expect to have their inquiries addressed promptly, often within hours. "Expect to be served within the shortest time possible," Dr. Oluoch assured, underlining the College's drive to deliver services with speed and efficiency.

The review has significantly enhanced key services related to the processing of academic documents, including transcripts, certificates, and overseas document authentication. The processing time for transcripts has been improved to ten working days, while verification of academic certificates and transcripts now takes just one working day. The College has so far dispatched approximately 22,000 transcripts to various Campuses for students who completed their Final Qualifying Examinations in January/February and June/July, 2024. Devolving the issuance of transcripts will improve the turnaround time for delivering the service and reduce travel costs for students.

Additionally, authentication services for documents requested by overseas institutions will be completed within five working days, underscoring the College's commitment to providing timely and accessible services.

These developments reinforce the College's long-standing commitment to excellence in public service, as it continues to position itself as a leader in healthcare training and service delivery. Through strategic automation and a focus on customer-centric operations, the College is setting new standards for public service institutions in Kenya.

College Hosts Director of Novo Nordisk Foundation

0 n September 11, 2024, the CEO Dr. Kelly Oluoch hosted Mette Davidsen, the Director of Global Health Programs at the Social and Humanitarian Department of the Novo Nordisk Foundation. She was accompanied by Mr. Mathias Krarup, Director of Legal at the Novo Nordisk Foundation, Mr. Eric Mwema, Senior Commercial Advisor at the Danish Embassy in Kenya, and other officials.

The visit follows the launch in January 2024 of the Kshs 100 million Partnership for Education of Health Professionals (PEP), a collaboration among KMTC, the Novo Nordisk Foundation, the Ministry of Health, and other partners aimed at addressing Cardiometabolic Diseases (CMD) in Kenya.

During the meeting, Dr. Oluoch expressed gratitude to the Novo Nordisk Foundation for their partnership in combating CMDs. He highlighted the project's successes, which include the establishment of a diverse technical working group and the development of a baseline survey tool designed to enhance pre- and in-service curricula focused on CMDs.

Ms. Davidsen thanked KMTC for partnering with the Foundation, emphasizing that the collaboration would strengthen the relationship between the two institutions. "We are partnering with KMTC because it is a successful organization in training a competent health workforce," she stated. She added, "As a Foundation, we are committed to extending the existing PEP program to ensure that vulnerable Kenyans benefit from this collaboration."

She also noted the historic ties of KMTC Karen Campus with Denmark, as it was donated by the Danish government in recognition of Kenya's independence.

In May 2024, the Novo Nordisk Foundation donated computers and e-learning equipment to KMTC to support teaching and learning.

0 n September 19, 2024, Karuri Campus, in collaboration with the Ministry of Health, the County Government of Kiambu, and Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT), marked National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month with a series of impactful events. The observance coincided with global efforts to promote mental health, aligned with World Suicide Prevention Day (September 10), which underscores the importance of proactive intervention and support in preventing suicide.

Suicide remains a significant public health issue in Kenya, with a national suicide rate of 11 percent per 100,000 people, according to government data. The events at KMTC Karuri aimed to raise awareness about the warning signs of suicide, encourage open dialogue around mental health, and foster community-wide understanding of the critical need for prevention efforts.

In alignment with international best practices, the commemoration focused on breaking the stigma surrounding mental health, a key barrier to help-seeking behaviour. The Campus, together with local partners, organized community awareness marches with banners displaying suicide prevention messages. This public demonstration served as

a visible reminder of the shared responsibility in addressing mental health challenges.

Peer-to-peer support activities also played a central role, as the Campus students engaged their peers in discussions, underscoring that seeking help is a sign of strength, not weakness. The event highlighted the critical role of healthcare professionals not only in addressing physical health issues but also in providing compassionate mental health care, a priority that KMTC emphasizes through its holistic training programs.

The collaboration reaffirmed the College's commitment to educating healthcare professionals who are equipped to tackle the mental health crisis through awareness, advocacy, and action. As seen in international frameworks for suicide prevention, this multidisciplinary approach is essential for building resilient communities and offering hope to those affected by suicide.

The College continues to be at the forefront of mental health advocacy, contributing to a mentally healthier society through education, community engagement, and proactive support.

BREAKING THE STIGMA

Understanding Medication in Mental Illness Treatment

n my short practice in the mental health subsector, one of the noticeable drawbacks in achieving optimal mental illness management is the stigma, myths and misconceptions that surround the role and benefit of medication in treatment of conditions or management of symptoms vis a vis the potential side effects.

This stigma especially is centered around the individual patients, the society and rampant misinformation, that ends up influencing individual and public attitude and perception towards these vital medicines.

This has led to many patients even the ones with seemingly treatment responsive conditions, declining or delaying the initiation of crucial function restoring medical intervention.

One of the commonest concerns is the paradoxical question from the patients on whether the prescribed medication has potential of 'messing with their brain'. Fair enough no one wishes to have the most important organ in their body messed around with, however once one presents with symptoms indicating a potential mental disorder, the most prudent way of ensuring that no further mess occurs is accurate and early initiation of crucial medical and psychotherapeutic interventions as advised by the professionals.

These concerns however have abounded for ages, and with the human brain being described as the most unique and complex structure in the whole universe, as evidenced by its intricate functionality and architecture, guessing the reason for these concerns is a no brainer.

Modern medicine has made major strides in treatment of conditions afflicting other key bodily organs like the heart, the kidneys and the liver, the human brain is still minimally understood presenting as an endless mystery and extreme sensitivity and caution in its approach is usually employed.

Experts have toiled and moiled in a bid to come up with drugs that can work best in relieving mental illnesses symptoms while at the same time enabling one to maintain optimal motor, autonomic and cognitive abilities.

The negative perception towards the known side effects of long-term use of mental illness medication has led to non-adherence as evidenced by, self-dose reduction or discontinuation of use altogether, presenting a major challenge to the medical practitioners and policy makers.

We are cognizant of some detrimental and occasionally severe side effects posed by some variants, especially the first generation (typical antipsychotics) medication used in management of some of these ailments. However, most of the other categories like the anti-depressants for depression treatment, anxiolytics for anxiety disorders, mood stabilizers for emotional regulation, stimulants for treatment of conditions like attention deficit hyperactivity disorders, have high safety profile with the benefits of their use outweighing the potential risks.

Lest we forget, it's imperative to point out that the arrival at an effective and safe medication for any condition is a long and arduous learning journey with many twists and turns, as the pharmaceutical scientists strive for an optimally efficacious molecule with minimal undesired effects.

Even with all this, there is still no absolutely safe drug for any condition without potential side effects, and this varies with select individual's response, dosage and the molecules mode of action.
